


FIT 1 EXAMS



HOLIDAY PLANS






Ryan Year 13

SECRET SANTA




GIFT TIME



Headteacher's Remarks



YOUR WORD BE YOUR BOND

British Army officer, Captain Robert Campbell captured during World War I was granted leave to visit his dying mother on one condition – that he returned to the POW Camp. Captain Robert Campbell had been taken prisoner during the opening weeks of the First World War and sent to a prisoner-of-war camp in Magdeburg. In 1916, he received news that his mother Louise was dying from cancer. In despair, he wrote to Kaiser Wilhelm II and asked for a period of leave so that he could return to England to make one last visit to his adored mother.

Moved by the request, Kaiser Wilhelm II granted him two weeks of leave with two days added at either end to allow for travel. The Kaiser's only condition was that Captain Campbell should give his word that he would return. How easy would it have been after two years in captivity for Captain Campbell to simply remain in the United Kingdom once his period of leave had expired?

However, like a true gentleman, he kept his word and returned from Kent to Germany as he had promised the Kaiser, where he stayed until the war ended in 1918. We are living through a period of seismic social change and a shifting moral landscape as new challenges and priorities emerge.

Some values seem to erode with the change. The concept of honour, honesty, integrity sounds a little old-fashioned and is in danger of becoming parodied in grainy black and white images from war films. Are morals or values eternal? Do they depend upon the prevailing societal norms? Are they only applicable in certain contexts?

Back in mediaeval days, men would hold their words to the highest esteem. Don't throw your word around loosely but let it mean honour and integrity to you. Don't tell lies or make promises you won't commit to. Lies have an in-built weakness but if you always tell the truth, you will never have to remember what you said. The failure to keep one's word affects you on two fundamental levels, your relationship with others where you diminish in the eyes of the others who begin to see you as not dependable. The other deeper level is when you can't keep your word to yourself. This affects your self-esteem if you can't commit to the goals you set for yourself. When the time comes to accomplish something greater, you won't have the innate resources to do it because you are always half-step, procrastinating and are half-committed. When you commit to something, let it be 100% especially your word to self with your No being NO and your YES being the absolute YES. Only say YES to things that are worthy of your YES.

It is permissible that we critically reflect on and not simply embrace values that might be outdated, imperialist or simply unkind. The causes of gender inequality, poverty through corruption, social injustice, human rights abuse, alongside the challenges presented by environmental issues have contributed to the abandonment or recalibration of many of the values that were long considered immutable/absolute. These have to be collectively questioned as early as now. The selflessness and bravery demonstrated by Captain Campbell is utterly inspiring. Captain Campbell returned to Germany because if he had failed to do so then it is highly unlikely that any leeway would have been extended to other officers in similar circumstances. In different ways, the courage, stoicism, integrity and resilience demonstrated by Captain Campbell can teach us a good deal about honour and the importance of our words. YOUR WORD IS YOUR BOND.
