At the moment, our greatest focus is on Year 11 and 13 Targeted Revision by looking through examination skills; planning answer sequence, levels of response, conceptual understanding, syllabus coverage checklist, mark allocation, question anticipation, use of model answers and tutorials.

Remember, practice multiplies your ability and understanding. Focus on completing past papers. There is no point in learning lots of 'facts' if you are unable to apply this knowledge in practice. Examiners know what they want – they provide exemplars and mark schemes which explicitly spell out what you need to do to get full marks or achieve a top grade. Perceive this aspect of revision as being something akin to a military operation or perhaps following a recipe. Your job is to complete the mission or to serve up to the examiner the exact dish that he ordered in your restaurant. Give them exactly what they are asking for. Do not go off-piste but 'play the game' according to the rules set down by the examination board. The more past papers you complete the better you will become in examinations skills. At this point, we want you to be good at passing your examinations and your teachers are also helping you get better at it.

Finally, I believe that with engaged parents, a deliberate team of teaching staff and effort-driven students, I expect a continuous and sustainable advancement in learning and teaching in Nairobi Academy and high attainment as well. Be a thinker. Always work hard. Communicate effectively and continue to make those meaningful connections in order to develop as a unique individual wo is Able to learn. Able to do. Able to engage.
