The task seemed straightforward at first, but it quickly turned into a battle of endurance and resilience. As I descended, the weight's resistance and the increasing pressure tested my limits, forcing me to abandon the attempt and resurface gasping for air.

The next challenge involved removing extra clothing in the water to simulate aiding a casualty. Despite initial struggles, I adapted and completed the task. Through these challenges, I learned that scouting is about perseverance and mental strength in the face of difficulty. I encourage others to test their physical and mental endurance by joining the scouting movement.

I participated in a scout life-saving exercise at the local swimming pool designed to give practical experience in water rescue techniques. Although confident in my swimming skills, I faced unexpected challenges. One task involved retrieving a 5kg weight from the pool's bottom, which was more difficult underwater due to resistance and buoyancy. I also accidentally swallowed chlorinated pool water while returning to the edge with the weight, which disrupted the task briefly. Wearing a t-shirt and shorts during the exercise made swimming harder due to the drag and added weight from waterlogged clothing. Eventually, I had to remove the clothes mid-swim to continue effectively. The experience highlighted the physical demands of life-saving and showed how theory differs from real-life scenarios. It taught me the importance of proper training and being prepared for unpredictable situations during water rescues.




